Historic Poulsbo's Trees

Welcome to Poulsbo, located along Liberty Bay in the Puget Sound region and a destination for many who would savor the unique atmosphere of "Little Norway". Many of the early European settlers were attracted to this area because of the lush forest which occupied the Kitsap Peninsula. Logging, along with fishing and associated occupations, was one of the principal reasons that a community developed along the shores of Liberty Bay. In time, the forest was cleared for farms and community and little remained of the original forest. There was still an interest in trees and many different kinds were planted by those early citizens.

Today, as Poulsbo grows around us, we've noted some of these special trees — some distinguished for their size, others for the fact that they are different from the trees that grew in that early forest (alder, big leaf maple, Douglas fir, western red cedar and others). Many of these "Significant Trees" have been identified on the map in this pamphlet and can be easily seen from the street in the historic core area. They can best be viewed on foot and at a leisurely walking pace. At the same time you will be able to see some of old town's wonderful older homes.
