A message from Mayor Erickson

Since our last newsletter, Kitsap County was approved by Governor Inslee to apply to move to Phase 2 of his Safe Start Plan. On May 27, 2020, the Kitsap Health District Board voted to move forward with applying for the variance after hearing from Dr. Susan Turner, Kitsap County's Health Officer.

The Governor [approved our variance](#) on May 28, 2020. During Phase 2 the following is allowed:

- Recreation: Outdoor recreation involving 5 or fewer people outside your household (camping, beaches, etc.)
- Gatherings: Gather with no more than 5 people outside your household
- Travel: Essential travel and limited non-essential travel for Phase I & II permissible activities
- Businesses/employers:
 - Remaining manufacturing
 - Additional construction phases
 - In-home/domestic services (nannies, housecleaning, etc.)
 - Retail (in-store purchases allowed with restrictions)
 - Real estate
 - Professional services/office-based businesses (telework remains strongly encouraged)
 - Hair and nail salons/barbers
 - Pet grooming
 - Restaurants/taverns <50% capacity and table size no larger than 5 (no bar-area seating)



This means more people are back to work, more businesses are open, more recreational opportunities are available, and we will see economic improvements. This also means personal responsibility increases. Remember to physically distance yourself from others, and if you cannot stay six feet apart, wear a face mask. Continue washing your hands. If you are sick, stay home. And most importantly, we must be compassionate with each other. In Poulsbo, we all understand our responsibilities and trust our citizens.

The Kitsap County Department of Emergency Management has also created a new [Pathway to Recovery Playbook](#) which provides one-stop shopping for everything you need to know about doing business as we move forward. It includes guidance for keeping employees and customers safe as we begin Phase 2 and

beyond.

In addition to this, I have been working closely with the Poulsbo Chamber of Commerce and the Historic Downtown Poulsbo Association on the Poulsbo Safe campaign. Our goal is to help support business owners in our community with the latest information regarding a safe re-opening, while also providing resources for them to make this task as smooth as possible. At the May 20, 2020, Poulsbo City Council meeting, I presented my ideas on a business recovery plan. Our residents need more space as they shop and recreate. Ideas include relaxing our local regulations to allow businesses to move out on to the sidewalks and parking stalls to provide more space for their customers (a “Summer Fair”) and changing some road configurations to allow for more space for pedestrians to safely walk. I expect to bring forward the “Summer Fair” concept and the provision to provide greater walking spaces on city streets to the City Council on June 3rd.

Finally, I want to take this opportunity to thank all of Poulsbo’s citizens and our businesses for slowing the rate of infection by staying home during these unprecedented times. On March 23rd we started the Stay Home, Stay Healthy order, and I know it has been challenging for everyone. This is a new territory for all of us. Moving towards Phase 2 is a positive step forward. We need to continue to follow preventative steps and adopt new behaviors so we can move forward to Phase 3 of the Safe Start Plan.

Keep strong, Poulsbo! I have every confidence in our community to come back vibrant and full of life, but life in a little different way. Our community has always accepted and conquered challenges. I am confident in Poulsbo’s ability to adapt and thrive in this new world.

City Hall Closures

Poulsbo Cares



The City of Poulsbo, in partnership with Gateway Fellowship, Poulsbo Fishline, and Empact Northwest continues its “Poulsbo Cares” initiative to address some of the COVID-19 related needs of North Kitsap residents. Poulsbo Cares has three elements: (1) It helps Poulsbo residents unable to leave their homes to shop because of COVID-19 risk; (2) It provides free meals for anyone struggling financially in North Kitsap; and (3) It provides a day shelter, showers, internet, and laundry for people who are homeless through the generous support of the Kitsap County Department of Human Services.

Poulsbo Cares volunteers have worked hundreds of hours since the initiative began to help residents throughout Kitsap. Volunteers cook community meals, deliver food, distribute flyers, check in on homebound seniors, and find creative ways to reduce the stress of “stay at home” requirements. One of our favorite examples: Poulsbo Library Manager (and Super Librarian) Sharon called to recommend novels to a homebound individual who missed her Kitsap Regional Library branch—and then several of the books were (anonymously) purchased and delivered by a one of our volunteers. 

Parks and Recreation Survey

Poulsbo Parks and Recreation is working on a revised summer plan and will have it posted on the city website in June. We hope to have some programs that start in late June and go through August. This will include a variety of summer camps and classes for youth and the community at-large. Engineering and Building Department Updates

Construction progress continues as the Engineering and Building Departments continue to review permits and move projects forward within the limits of the Government COVID-19 Stay Home, Stay Healthy Order. Staff are working remotely to service project needs and a skeleton crew is holding down the fort at City Hall. We encourage phone calls or email to connect remotely with staff as needed.



Building Department:

The Building Department is currently providing inspections on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. In accordance with the approval of Phase II COVID-19 measures. Permits are ready for pick up at the City of Poulsbo. Construction sites are required to implement a COVID-19 plan and inspections can be scheduled where appropriate practices are in place.

Payment for permits can be made online, or email our building department to schedule payment via the phone at this time.

Engineering and Development Review:

Engineering Development Review continues to receive multiple new Site Plans and Preliminary Plat applications. We are working in tandem with the Planning Department to review projects expeditiously and advance them towards being construction ready. More than 16 site applications are currently under review.

The Firestone project in the Olhava development is currently under construction and progress can be viewed by driving by the site in Olhava. Additionally, the Plats of Crystal View and Poulsbo Meadows are making strides in developments. Poulsbo Meadows will provide 46 new Single-family lots to Poulsbo once completed and Crystal View Phase 1 will provide 21 new Single-family lots. Both projects are aiming for final plat and start of home construction in fall of this year.

As Kitsap County is elevated into Phase II of the Governor's Phased Re-Opening Plan, the long anticipated Fairfield Hotel is expected to begin construction. This project will bring a new 101 room hotel to the City of Poulsbo Olhava business park. All other active grading permits will be given notice that they are able to resume construction with adherence to Phase II Construction Safety Guidelines and Requirements provided by the State and County.

City of Poulsbo Capital Projects

State Route 305 & Johnson Road Roundabout Construction moving forward

The City of Poulsbo, in collaboration with the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) and Kitsap County, is continuing momentum with the start of construction on improvements at the intersection of Johnson Way and SR 305. The project was advertised, and contractor bids were opened May 22, 2020. The City is in the process of confirming the bid and awarding the construction contract. Construction could begin as early as this summer or at the latest March 2021. This project is the final result of extensive public involvement including the City's 2008 Noll Road Corridor Study and the collaborative multi-jurisdictional efforts of the SR305 Corridor Study. The existing connection to SR 305 via the Noll Road intersection causes traffic delays and is a safety concern for motor vehicles and non-motorized users. This project will provide safer access to SR305 with the construction of a roundabout at the new intersection of Johnson Road and a non-motorized tunnel crossing at SR305. Upgraded transit stops near the roundabout and Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFBs) will be provided for safer access to transit. SR305 will continuously maintain two lanes of traffic; however, citizens should expect some delays during construction with occasional periods of flagged traffic control. The construction is expected to take up to a year and a half.



Finance Department Updates

The City of Poulsbo's Finance Department continues to maintain normal operations as well as manage the City's fiscal response to COVID-19. There is heavy focus on the facilitation of capital projects, community assistance, revenue projections, utility billing, recovery planning, and the management of Federal Assistance programs. While City Hall remains closed to the public, customer service is available via phone, e-mail, and the City website.

In compliance with the Governor's Stay Home, Stay Healthy proclamation, department staff are working remotely, as well as in shifts at City Hall to maintain adequate social distance. We sincerely appreciate the flexibility and understanding demonstrated by the community as we continue to function under these recommendations. The request to leave a voicemail with return contact information in the event you are unable to immediately reach a representative remains in effect. In the absence of extenuating circumstances, voicemails will be returned within approximately one business day. For those

Further information regarding the reopening of City Hall will be forthcoming from the City, and we look forward to the progression of Kitsap County into Phase 3 of the Governor's Safe Start plan. Meanwhile, the department continues to make preparations for the safety of staff and visitors within City Hall once approval to reopen in Phase 3 has been received. Steps taken to protect the community will include the placement of foot markings to facilitate six feet of distance between visitors and the installation of a transparent barrier at the cashier counter to minimize the potential spread of airborne pathogens during your transaction. The department applauds Poulsbo's consideration of the Governor's recommendations over the past several months, and selfless implementation of that guidance, which will continue to keep our community healthy and safe as we advance through the phased reopening.

Parks & Recreation Updates



In recognition of the Governor's *Stay Safe Stay Healthy* proclamation, Poulsbo Parks and Recreation remains closed until additional information is available. Staff has continued serving the public by answering phone calls, addressing concerns, and registering people for future programs or facility rentals via phone from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday at 360-779-9898 or at parksrec@cityofpoulsbo.com

Parks and Recreation staff members are doing their jobs from home, preparing for the eventual re-opening of the Recreation Center and future programs, **estimated to be in Phase 3 or late**

June. There are still so many questions to be answered before we can offer programs, events and group use at the parks and in the recreation center.

The Spring/Summer brochure was mailed out March 16, **but we will be putting out an updated, online version in June.** All programs through May 2020 have been cancelled, and we will adjust any program dates for summer once we have more information. A few instructors have chosen to teach electronically (outlined in this newsletter). The Raab Park Community P-Patch gardeners to continue gardening keeping the 6' social distancing. We have cancelled all facility rentals at the Recreation Center and have talked with everyone who has rented the park picnic shelters until Phase 3.

City parks and trails remain open. The restrooms at the parks are closed. Signs are posted at the parks say "Maintain 6' social distancing".

Capital Park Projects Update

Poulsbo's Fish Park

The City will be going out to bid this summer for improvements to Poulsbo's Fish Park. A renovated parking lot on Bond Road, new boardwalk leading into the park, and a new sidewalk and trail to the waterfront parcel on the estuary will provide additional public access and enjoyment of our aquatic resources in the city.

Play for All at Raab Park

Play for All at Raab Park is a community effort to develop and build a fully inclusive playground in Poulsbo. The Poulsbo-North Kitsap Rotary Club is leading the effort in partnership with the City of Poulsbo, the Kitsap Community Foundation, special interest groups and passionate citizens. Local professionals including



Susan Murray of Studio-Hansen Roberts Landscape Architects and Aaron Murphy of ADM Architecture have lent their professional expertise to help develop the plan. Fundraising is ongoing, with a target build date of Summer 2021.

Poulsbo Events and Recreation Center (the PERC)

The City of Poulsbo recently entered into an agreement with the Kitsap County Public Facilities District to assess the feasibility of constructing a 30,000 to 40,000 PERC square foot public event and recreation center on City-owned property near the Olympic College Campus at Poulsbo's College Market Place. The Poulsbo Events and Recreation Center will include an events space, indoor recreation facilities, and up to four acres of synthetic turf fields. In May 2020, the City hired Perteet to conduct a feasibility study of the project over the next several months, which will involve several elements, including:

- Supporting the City with their outreach to the community and key stakeholders
- Conducting a market analysis to assess and identify the demand for the PERC
- Preparing a preliminary management and marketing strategy for PERC operations
- Evaluating site conditions and developing a conceptual site plan for the PERC and ancillary facilities (parking, infrastructure, trails)
- A financial analysis of the development costs, community benefits (i.e. jobs, tax revenue) and operational commitments including potential funding sources Coordination with the Kitsap Public Facilities District to ensure ILA commitments and milestones are being achieved

Justice in a Time of Pandemic -Municipal Court Updates

Like every person and every City department, COVID-19 has thrown Poulsbo Municipal Court for a loop. We are doing our best to follow the rules from Governor Inslee and Chief Justice Stephens, while, at the same time, keeping the court personal and professional. Here are some of the existing coronavirus challenges:

Technology/Signatures. The norm now is for courts to hold hearings via Zoom or, if a person does not have a computer, telephonically. Seldom is the defendant in court in person. On a telephonic hearing, how do I know who I am speaking with? Getting a signature on a Promise to Appear or a Judgment & Sentence is impossible in many cases. Can I issue a warrant for someone who failed to appear at a court hearing with only a verbal promise on the record, but no written signature on paper?

Space. Where could we put 20-30 jurors to be selected and/or empaneled, keeping six feet between each other? We could spread the jurors throughout the courtroom seats, but where would we put non-jury members interested in watching the trial? Where could a 6-member jury deliberate, needing a room at least 72 feet long and 7 feet wide? My guess is that the Council Chambers is an obvious option, but it is not soundproof or view proof.

Masks. On the state judges' forum opinions vary widely as to what restrictions can be placed on an "open" courtroom. Can masks be required? A particular type of mask? Or, is a mask a "piece of clothing" that persons have the 1st Amendment right to wear, or not wear, as they choose?

Masks are potentially particularly problematic regarding witnesses. There is a body of law that opines not seeing the witness's full face would violate the defendant's Constitutional Right of confrontation; that a fair trial requires the defendant to see, and the jury to evaluate, among other things, the witness's body language, face and all. Additionally, there are issues with the Americans With Disabilities Act. If someone has sub-par hearing and needs to watch the speakers lips to know if they are hearing everything, how could they do that if the speaker is wearing a mask?

Speedy trial. The normal rules were that a defendant had the right to trial within 60 days if they are in custody, 90 days if they are out of custody. Recently Kitsap County District Court ordered that no trials will be held until at least August 26th. One smarty-pants judge felt we should revise the Constitutional Rights we give to defendants to say "You have the right to a speedy trial...unless we have a pandemic."

This, too, will pass. In the interim, we, like many departments are doing the best we can. As former Seahawks coach Chuck Knox would say, "playing the hand we were dealt." It will be wonderful, though, to get back to the old normal. If we ever do.

Police Department

Prosecutor's Office Update

The Prosecutor's Office has been working diligently with the Poulsbo Municipal Court on the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the provision of justice. This work includes discussions with the Court on proceeding with video hearings, adjusting the court calendars to handle the backlog of cases while balancing the longer time needed for each hearing to occur via video conferencing. We have also worked with the court in interpreting the State Supreme Court's Emergency Administrative Orders, as well as addressing the Municipal Court's Emergency Orders, both of which address new policies and rules in an effort to ensure justice while protecting the health of everyone involved in the justice system.

The Prosecutor has continued to appear for regular Wednesday court calendars, as well as daily video criminal in-custody calendars as needed. Beginning June 1st, we will be appearing for our new temporary court calendar structures on both Wednesday and Thursdays. Our office has continued to review and file any cases submitted by law enforcement or motion for probation revocation as needed.

Finally, the Prosecutor has continued to provide legal advice to the Poulsbo Police Department, remaining on call 24/7, including to present statements of probable cause to the court as needed over the weekends.

Public Works Update

Parks Department:

Mowing in Poulsbo parks has begun. Restrooms will open at the Waterfront Park and Raab Park; however, all other public restrooms will remain closed.

A reminder to all visitors to continue following safe social distancing guidelines and protocols to promote safe and respectful use of City Parks. Here are a few suggestions for your visits to Poulsbo trails and parks:

- Do not use parks or trails if you are feeling sick.

- Try and limit your visit to two hours or less. If your chosen park is crowded, go elsewhere or come back another time.
- Keep six feet between you and anyone who doesn't live with you.
- Leave at least one parking space between vehicles.
- Keep your hands clean and avoid touching any high traffic surfaces (railings, handles, picnic tables, playgrounds). When you must be in close contact with others, wear a mask that covers your nose and mouth.
- Always pack out what you pack in, including gloves and masks.

Water Department:

The City of Poulsbo serves its citizens water from five wells with depths ranging from 280' to 710'. The composition of well water has a higher mineral content than surface water. Some of these minerals, namely iron and manganese, have a tendency to occasionally cause discolored water. These are naturally occurring minerals that don't pose a health risk but can be aesthetically unpleasing. We flush our mains twice a year to remove any collected sediment in the water. The City has also built a Water Treatment Plant that serves the Upper and Middle Zones and plan to have another Treatment Plant completed that will serve the Olhava Zone.

In April of 2018, the Lincoln Treatment Plant was put into service. It filters the water using naturally derived media such as manganese dioxide. This treatment process has been extremely effective in the removal of iron and manganese. The raw manganese content of our Lincoln wells has tested as high as .141 parts per million. After filtration, the manganese level in the finished water has regularly tested between .01 parts per million and non-detectable levels. Reducing the amount of iron and manganese in the water creates cleaner water for our customers and greatly reduces the amount of water that is wasted due to the decreased need for flushing.

The City plans to have a second Filtration Plant in operation by the end of 2021. This will serve our customers in the Olhava and North Viking corridors. Upon completion of the Westside Treatment Plant, over 60% of our citizens will enjoy filtered water from one of our two treatment plants.

Sewer Department:

Wipes are causing problems in our sewer systems nationwide. We are encouraging you to only flush toilet paper, not disinfecting wipes or other non-flushable items that should be disposed of in the trash. Flushing only toilet paper helps ensure that the toilets, plumbing, sewer systems and septic systems will continue working properly to safely manage our wastewater. While the City encourages disinfecting your environment to prevent the spread of COVID-19, never flush disinfecting wipes or other non-flushable items.

Preventable toilet and sewer backups can pose a threat to human health and present an extra challenge to our water utilities and their workforce. Flushing anything other than toilet paper, including disinfecting wipes, can damage internal plumbing, local sewer systems and septic systems. Fixing these backups is costly and takes time and resources away from ensuring that wastewater management systems are otherwise working properly.

Having fully operational wastewater services is critical to containing COVID-19 and protecting Americans from other public health risks. Our wastewater employees are everyday heroes who are on the front line of protecting human health and the environment every single day.

Solid Waste:

Streets:

Roadside mowing, street striping, and repairs have begun. These workers could be your family, friends, the moms or dads of your child's friends, the people down the street, or a local baseball coach. Please slow down, pay attention, and give them plenty of room to work.

Risk Management Updates

The Risk Management department has continued in its constant evaluation of the new and ever-changing risks and potential liabilities to the City, staff, and visitors in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes keeping track of, reviewing, and interpreting each of the Governor's Proclamations, phased re-opening plans, industry re-opening guidance, as well as federal and state agency guidelines, recommendations, and requirements. The department has also continued in drafting and recommending new policies and plans to address this new and changing environment. We have provided advice to departments as requested or needed related to COVID-19 impacts on City operations and served as the Safety Officer for

Reminder - Seasonal Averaging

With more residents staying at home and an unusually warm spring thus far, please remember, for residential accounts, "seasonal averaging" of the sewer portion of your utility bill does not commence until your June billing cycle; your June bill consists of water usage beginning mid-May. Please keep in mind all usage prior to this will not be averaged and your sewer will be billed under the winter rate structure. Reminder - Preventing Legionella in Building Water Systems and Facilities Shut Down During COVID-19 Outbreak

As businesses and buildings start to reopen the City of Poulsbo would like to remind people to take some precautions when it comes to the health and safety of their workers.
