## **PROCLAMATION**

WHEREAS. Liberty Bay provided early Scandinavian settlers with opportunities for fishing and boatbuilding, forming the foundation of Poulsbo's community; and

WHEREAS. Poulsbo's location on the bay made steamships vital to its early growth and connection to Puget Sound; and

WHEREAS, Commercial fishing and canneries, including the Pacific Coast Codfish Company the largest on the West Coast—drove Poulsbo's economy and employed many residents; and

WHEREAS, Poulsbo has been and continues to be home to independent commercial fisherman that at one point numbered over 80 vessels that fished for salmon, halibut, and cod; and

WHEREAS, other maritime industries flourished in the City of Poulsbo including boat builders Chris Haugen, Martin Bjermeland, Ronald Young in his basement shop on Front Street, and many others; and

the members of the Poulsbo Historical Society identified the need to share the WHEREAS. heritage and artifacts from the Pacific Coast Codfishing Company, and from many of the commercial fisherman, and boat builders that resided in Poulsbo so that future generations could see, touch, and learn about the maritime heritage that plays a large part in the history of Poulsbo; and

WHEREAS, the community came together and established the Poulsbo Maritime Museum whose grand opening was September 12, 2015;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Rebecca Erickson, Mayor of the City of Poulsbo, Washington, do hereby proclaim September 12, 2025, as:
